- **Swap Area at Medfield Transfer Station**: Open May – October 9am – 3:00pm. Last drop off at 2:30. Transfer station permit required. Items remaining at 2:30pm may be put in the trash.
- www.earth911.com: Identify material to recycle and site provides locations for drop-off.
- **Towels, animal carriers and crates, unopened pet food, etc.**: Bring to the Medfield Animal Shelter. Drop off at front door. 99 West St., Medfield. 508-359-8989
- **Packing peanuts**: Take for reuse to Postal Center USA, 14 Milliston Rd., Millis, 508 376-1200. Express Business, 940 High Street (109), Westwood. 781-329-8444
- **Plastic/foam packaging materials**: The UPS stores in Franklin (430 Franklin Village Drive, 508-520-3766) and Framingham, (1257 Worcester Rd, 508-875-8000) take peanuts, bubble wrap, packing pillows and soft foam sheets.
- **Prescription drugs**: Drop off unused and expired prescription drugs at Medfield Police Station. Do not flush!
- **Hangers**: Take back to your dry cleaner for reuse/recycling.
- **Bikes**: www.bikesnotbombs.org: Donates used bikes directly to communities around the world. 18 Bartlett Sq., Jamaica Plain. 617-522-0226

- **Eyeglasses**: Contact your local Lenscrafters or www.lionsclubs.org. Lions drop-off box at Blue Moon Bakery, Medfield.
- **Used packaging** (such as juice and baby food pouches and candy bar wrappers): www.terracycle.com pays non-profit groups for collecting used packaging. Wrappers are made into retail products like notebooks and bags. Consider coordinating a wrapper collection!
- **Fluorescent tubes and CFL bulbs**: May not be thrown in the trash and must be disposed of properly. Take to the shed at the Medfield Transfer Station (sticker required) or drop them at the Public Works Office in the Medfield Town Hall, at Wills Hardware, 75 West St., or purchase a recycling kit from www.thinkgreenfromhome.com.
- **Old mercury thermostats, thermometers, & button cell batteries** can be dropped off at the Public Works Department at Medfield Town Hall.
- **Newspapers, magazines, catalogs, mail and other paper (no cardboard or phonebooks)**: Paper Retriever recycling bins located at Wheelock School and Church of the Advent, on Pleasant Street, Medfield.
- **Plastic bags**: Drop-off at Transfer Station, Shaws, Roche Brothers, and Brothers Market. Bags should be clean and dry without receipts. Bags accepted include: grocery bags, retail bags (hard plastic and string handles removed), paper towel and toilet paper plastic wrap, plastic newspaper bags, plastic dry cleaning bags, all clean, clear bags labeled with a #2 or #4. Do NOT include the following which are considered contaminants and could jeopardize the entire load of recyclables: no food or cling wrap, no prepackaged food bags including frozen food bags (e.g. prewashed salad bags), no compostable or bio-based plastic bags. www.plasticbagrecycling.org.
